




Project No. 1 Graduation Collection

Tangled threads served as the medium for expressing the various stages of PTSD, for I found it's resemblance with unprocessed thoughts , quite uncanny.


Emergency Hyper-vigirant


Project No. 1 Graduation Collection 20891902 UNPAID HYPERUIGILANT Look 1

Comprises of a structured jacket, heavily boned made out out of black banana crepe and silk taffeta lining. The silhouette is supposed to mimic the overpowering nature of trauma. The patchwork representing the eye stands as a symbol of hyper-awareness and being the only motif on the black background and because of the scale, would feel overwhelming. The jacket is larger in proportion and volume and circular boneing channels running horizontally across the lower half imitates a cage.



Comprises of a high-neck dress made of layers of polyester mesh. The surface is created by hand embroidering. Pieces of threads are sandwiched in between layers of mesh in an attempt to understand numbness. Even though it's presence is visible, it is not tangible. CAREGIVER'S STRESS:
A LESS REPRESENTED SOCIAL ISSUE

RESEARCH

Worldwide, the burden of mental disorders (MDs) on the public health system has grown significantly. According to estimates, the burden of MDs is 14% worldwide, with developing nations bearing the largest burden, which contributes to ongoing economic hardship and below-average productivity both at the individual and national levels. MD contributes significantly to global disability-adjusted life years. Particularly in low- and middle-income nations, MDs significantly reduce the quality of life for both patients and the family members or friends who care for them. The whole physical, emotional, and monetary costs of caring for a family member who has a medical condition have been referred to as caregiver burden. Distress, stigma, concern, humiliation, and guilt are all part of the caregiver experience, while the positive encouragement revolves around caregiver appreciation.

## INFERENCE

People with MDs have received the majority of the attention from researchers and mental health practitioners in recent years. There is now a need to concentrate on MD patients' caregivers as well, particularly in developing nations where there are insufficient health systems for handling patients with mental health issues and their caregivers. The lack of adequate health systems in underdeveloped nations has an impact on quality of life, making it harder to diagnose and treat mental health issues, as well as to document disability among community members who have MDs and increase the obligations on caregivers.

## INSPIRATION

happened to come across Franz Kafka's novel - 'The Metamorphosis', that explored themes like the absurdity of life, transformation, social alienation, family responsibility and loss of identity. The absurd situation that the characters find themselves in, resonates with the research, and could be subtly translated into the experience of a human struggling with MD and how their caregivers react to the situation.
